# Creative Inquiry in History: The Cemetery Historic Preservation Project

#### Course Overview

In this course, you will conduct research and participate in community engagement activities to assist with the development of the preservation plan and memorial for the African American Burial Ground, AP Calhoun Family Plot, and Woodland Cemetery. In February of 2020, two Clemson students visited the "Fort Hill Slave and Convict Cemetery" and found it in a state of disrepair. They worked with faculty and staff to clean up the site and install a memorial. Further research led the team to learn that there was a larger African American burial site on the west side of the cemetery. Using ground penetrating radar, more than 500 anomalies believed to be unmarked graves of African American enslaved persons, sharecroppers, tenant farmers, domestic laborers, convicted laborers, and wage workers and their families, were recovered in the cemetery. Clemson Trustees established a trustee task force and Legacy Council in late summer 2020 to develop a preservation and memorialization plan for the burial ground. As a CI Team Member, you will conduct archival research, help recover names of who may be buried in the cemetery and build family trees, participate in cemetery tours, assist with developing memorial design, and engage with campus and local communities.

#### **Attendance and Class Participation**

You are expected to come to class, participate in discussions and activities in class, and work together as a team toward our shared goal. This semester we will be presenting at the Creative Inquiry Research Showcase in April and your participation is required. Over the course of the semester, if you have more than three unexcused absences from the class, your participation grade will then be lowered 1 point per absence. The **Notification of Absence module in Canvas** allows you to quickly notify instructors (via an email) of an absence from class and provides for the following categories: court attendance, death of immediate family member, illness, illness of family member, injury, military duty, religious observance, scheduled surgery, university function, unscheduled hospitalization, other anticipated absence, or other unanticipated absence. The notification form requires a brief explanation, dates, and times. Based on the dates and times indicated, instructors are automatically selected, but you may decide which instructors will receive the notification. This does not serve as an "excuse" from class. It is a request for an excused absence and you are encouraged to discuss the absence with instructors, as the instructor is the only person who can excuse an absence. If you are unable to report the absence by computer, you may reach the Office of Advocacy and Success via 864.656.0935. Students with excessive absences who need academic or medical assistance can also contact the Office of Advocacy and Success.

#### **Built Environment Reflection**

For the first part of this semester, we will be learning about the cemetery and campus history in the context of race and the built environment. These discussions are meant to encourage CI Team Members and other students to start thinking about where and how to tell the story of Black history at Clemson. After our discussions and campus tours, you will be required to write a 500-word reflection on this topic.

#### **Community Engagement Activity**

You are expected to engage with the campus and local communities by attending a cemetery team event, visiting a local museum, attending a public community meeting, volunteering in local communities, or another approved activity. This semester we have several events planned, including cemetery tours, Black History Month events, Carrel Cowan-Ricks Remembrance Day in March, and the Black Business Expo in April. The activities will be listed on Canvas.

#### **Cemetery Tour Activity**

You are expected to participate as a guide in one cemetery tour for Black History Month. We will have tour guide training in class. You can either share a fact about the cemetery's history on the tour or be a walking guide.

#### Historical Research

For the last half of class, we will work together to locate, read, and analyze various primary sources related to the cemetery's history, including plantation documents, the census, death certificates, and Clemson College employee records. Working in groups, you will conduct this historical research in the campus archives and digital collections. You will analyze the sources with worksheets, research different collections together, and input information from those sources into spreadsheets for the project database. This research is meant to develop your skills in the historical research process, data collection, and to help the cemetery team recover names of individuals who may be buried in the cemetery, which contributes to the design of the memorial. Throughout the semester, you will also be required to complete two Research Check-Ins in which you will discuss your research process. These assignments are meant to keep you on track, as well as brainstorm ideas and think through challenges with your team members. You will present your research at the CI Research Showcase in early April. You will also share about your research and community engagement experiences on the last day of class with the cemetery team.

#### **Final Reflection**

At the end of class, instead of a final exam, you will individually write a final reflection on your experience as a CI Team Member. You will be required to discuss research and community engagement. The reflection should be **at least 1,500 words**, equivalent to 6 double-spaced pages.
